Primary Physical Education & Sport Premium

What is the Primary Physical Education & Sport Premium?

The government provided funding of £150 million per annum for the academic years 2013/14 and 2014/15 to provide new and substantial primary school sport funding. The funding was jointly provided by the Departments for Education, Health and Culture, Media and Sport, and is intended to allow primary school headteachers to spend on improving the quality of sport and PE for all their pupils. On 6th February 2014 the then Prime Minister, David Cameron committed to continue the funding for the Primary PE & Sport Premium until 2020.

Each school currently receives £8,000 plus an extra £5 per pupil each year – here at Ireby Church of England Primary School this will mean around £8,500 a year. The money can only be spent on sport and PE provision in schools.

Purpose of the Funding

Schools have to spend this funding on improving their provision of PE and sport, but have the freedom to choose how they do this.

Possible Uses of This Funding Include

- Hiring specialist PE teachers or qualified sports coaches to work alongside primary teachers when teaching PE
- New or additional Change4Life sport clubs
- Paying for professional development opportunities in PE/sport
- Providing cover to release primary teachers for professional development in PE/sport
- Running sport competitions, or increasing participation in the school games
- Buying quality assured professional development modules or material for PE/sport
- Providing places for pupils on after school sport clubs and residential visits

Vision for the Primary PE and Sport Premium

ALL pupils leaving primary school **physically literate** and with the **knowledge, skills and motivation** necessary to equip them for a **healthy, active lifestyle** and **lifelong participation** in physical activity and sport.

The funding has been provided to ensure impact against the following objective:

- To achieve self-sustaining improvement in the quality of PE and sport in primary schools. It is important to emphasise that the focus of spending must lead to long lasting impact against the vision (above) that will live on well beyond the Primary PE and Sport Premium funding.

It is expected that schools will see an improvement against the following 5 key indicators:

1. The engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity – kick-starting healthy active lifestyles;
2. The profile of PE and sport being raised across the school as a tool for whole school improvement;
3. Increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport;
4. Broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils;
5. Increased participation in competitive sport.

Accountability

Ofsted assesses how primary schools spend their PE and sport premium. We must also publish details of how we spend our PE and Sport Premium funding on the school's website:

- How much funding we received in the academic year;
- A full breakdown of how we've spent the funding or will spend the funding;
- The effect of the premium on pupils' PE and sport participation and attainment;
- How we intend to ensure that these improvements are sustainable.
